#### Field of Dreams Therapy Farm Looks To Bring Healing To Our Community

With a second chance at life, Laurie Drazek's horses frolic in wide open fields and greet her warm embrace with their bobbing heads and cheerful neighs. This differs from their earlier days of experiencing trauma and being neglected throwaways.

"Horses that have been abused usually don't trust humans," Drazek said. "At least humans can talk and share their feelings if they want to. Unfortunately, horses can't."

Drazek has rescued four horses and

one pony from auction houses and horse rescues in the last few years, she said. She rescued two miniature horses from the Central New England Equine Rescue in West Brookfield, she said. Cute and clunky, these horses look like basset hounds and take up little room in the barn.

Drazek also rescued two standard horses and more recently, one blind pony named Sully. One horse, Sophia, came from Camelot Auction House in New Jersey, currently known as Cranberry Sales Stables, she said. Now, Sophia bounces her head up and down in excitement for pats and hay, but her previous existence reveals a darker past.

When Drazek adopted Sophia, she had strangles, a bacterial disease in horses that can be fatal, Drazek said. Sophia received two months of veterinary care and almost died. When Sophia recovered, she refused to be touched and it took a year for Sophia to let Drazek pet her, Drazek said.

"Horses are like people who have

had trauma or abuse," Drazek said. "Oftentimes, they always remember."

Drazek's most recent rescue, a pony named Sully, lived in several foster homes and was shipped from Maine when it was discovered he couldn't be a riding horse due to his blindness and cataracts, she said.

Drazek said she was at the grain store when she saw a listing for Sully with Hearts and Hooves Rescue and Sanctuary about three months ago.

'He came running to me and I was

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Hildene is Paxton-area Seniors' Destination for Oct. 24, 2024

The Paxton-area Senior bus trip season is flying by quickly! Our next-to-last trip for the 2024 traveling season is Thursday, October 24, 2024.

We'll depart at 8:15 a.m. from Paxton Senior Center (Council on Aging, 17 West ST (Route 31), just south of the traffic light at the Paxton Common. Our first stop, other than a short break at the eclectic Guilford (VT) Welcome Center, is for lunch at 11:30 a.m. at the Publyk House in Bennington, VT. We depart there at 1:15 p.m. And within one half hour we will arrive at Hildene, the Lincoln Family home in Manchester, VT.

Robert Todd Lincoln was the only child of Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln to survive to maturity. We will enjoy a self-guided tour of their property which consists of a lot of choices: Fourteen (14) historic buildings, including the Georgian Revival mansion, formal gardens and observatory on this now 412-acre estate, Welcome Center, the Museum Store in the historic carriage barn, 1903 Pullman (train) car, Sunbeam (British auto) and the Hildene Farm.

We will make a quick stop (pmt. on your own) at the Brattleboro McDonalds on the way home, arriving back at the Paxton Senior Center at 7:30 p.m. The price for the entire day is \$126 and includes the delicious lunch, including gratuity, at the Publyk House; the self-guided tour at Hildene, the Lincoln Family Home; and the luxury Wilson Bus motor coach transportation. It does not include the bus driver's gratuity.

The Lincolns built the home as a summer home at the turn of the 20th Century. Robert first visited Manchester as a young man. Some 40 years later he returned to purchase 392 acres to build what he had called his ancestral home. Robert was president of the Pullman Company, the largest manufacturing corporation in the country, at that time.

Lunch at The Publyk House in Bennington begins with a salad of mixed greens, seasonal vegetables and Balsamic Vinaigrette dressing. Choose your entree from Roast Turkey dinner (mashed potatoes, stuffing, pan gravy and cranberry sauce); Homemade Layered Meatloaf (mashed potatoes, green beans, gravy and cheddar cheese); Baked New England Cod (cheddar and cracker crumb topping with lemon beurre blanc, mashed potatoes, seasonal vegetable medley); or Penne Pasta Primavera (tri-color peppers, broccoli, mushrooms, tomatoes, carrots and onions, tossed with pasta in olive oil, garlic, butter and white wine). All entrees come with salad, coffee/tea and seasonal fruit crisp or cobbler with fresh whipped cream for deceart.

in love," Drazek said. "He's a lovebug."
Dana Mcquire, Drazek's childhood
friend, said Sully felt "grateful to be
saved."

A 2001 Boston College graduate, Drazek is also a licensed clinical social worker in Massachusetts. In 2021, she bought a 21-acre field in Paxton, Massachusetts, building the "Field of Dreams Therapy Farm," while also living on the property with her life partner Kristine, she said.

At the time Drazek was rescuing Sophia nine years ago, she was working with an eight-year-old boy who faced "trauma and abuse issues," she said.

"Usually when you're working with people with trauma, you don't bring it up unless they do," Drazek said.

Drazek told the boy she was rescuing a mistreated horse, Drazek said. When Sophia's ears were touched, she would become agitated, implying she had been mistreated. The boy wrote notes to Sophia for Drazek to bring to the barn, she said.

One note told Sophia that it was going to "take time," but eventually she would be able to "trust Laurie," Drazek said. Drazek said this moment gave her a "vision."
"For the past ten years I have wanted

"For the past ten years I have wanted to put my two passions together," Drazek said. "Now we will have kids with special needs come and work with the horses and receive one-onone therapy."

Drazek's plans to combine her experience as a social worker with her love of rescuing horses began in March. In addition to one-on-one therapy, Drazek is working with

Seven Hills Foundation in Worcester, MA, which focuses on helping people with disabilities live dignified lives, according to their mission statement.

Jodie Krueger, who works with Seven Hills Foundation, brings a group of 10 individuals with special needs to Field of Dreams Therapy Farm to interact with the horses and help with farmwork, she said.

"This helps an undervalued group of individuals learn about farm life," Krueger said. "Here, they're accepted as they are, welcomed as they are, and loved as they are."

Krueger said she met Drazek one year ago and started bringing he friend and roommate, Beth, to Drazek's farm. Beth started living with Krueger through a program funded by the Department of Developmental Services called shared living, Krueger said.

"Shared living is when individuals are placed with families in their homes opposed to other living situations, like group homes," Krueger said. "As I became friends with Laurie and she needed volunteers at the farm, Beth would come with me because we go everywhere together.

Krueger said Beth wanted to help when she saw her cleaning the stalls. She also said she would want to do more each week they went to volunteer at Field of Dreams Therapy Farm.

"Now, Beth is the one reminding me we need to go to the farm on Saturdays to help with the horses," Krueger said. Beth said she comes to the farm to see the horses and because they make her feel "happy."

Krueger said when she saw how much she was enjoying her time on the farm, she spoke to Laurie about putting something together so people could be a part of the farm if they wanted to. "My experience working with people with various disabilities and Laurie's experience working with rescued horses and therapy just seemed like a good fit," Krueger said.

Krueger said she spoke to her supervisor about bringing individuals who would be interested in farm life to Field of Dreams Therapy Farm. She said her supervisor thought it was a great idea, and that's how a onceper-month program began for 10 individuals to come and "experience farm life."

"They got to learn about the animals and farming; they get exercise and companionship," Krueger said. "It's a win-win for everyone."

Drazek said horses are highly empathetic and sense trauma and anxiety in humans. The bond fostered when an abused horse is cared for by a person who has suffered trauma is "magical," she said. "We are their voices," Drazek said, referring to her horses. "Every person has a story, every horse has a story."

Drazek is offering one-on-one therapy at Field of Dreams Therapy Farm is an LLC and is located in Paxton, MA. Appointments can be made for therapy by phone at 774-696-3203.





accepted. Houses are also still selling quickly. If realtors are not getting their buyers into these properties in the first few days, there is a good chance the house will be gone. Realtors and buyers need to be aggressive and not wait days or weeks to act on a house. This is another reason I don't predict a housing crash. There are too many buyers still wanting to buy properties compared to the number of properties available for sale.

Another common statement buyers say to me is "I can't buy yet because I don't have a 20% down payment saved". If you haven't talked to a lender or real estate agent yet but think you need 20% down in order to purchase a house, you are wrong. Lenders and banks have various loan programs to offer and many of which do not require a large downpayment. Depending on your credit, where you are looking for a home and your price range there are options for 3-5% down payments. You can also work with your realtor to wrap some or all of your closing costs into the offer in some cases so you can essentially finance your closing costs and not need to have that money out of pocket either.

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## Garden Guru: Is It Too Late To Plant?

It's not too late!

Every year at this time I always get the question "is it too late to plant?" We plant new plantings right up until the ground freezes! One of the nice things about planting at this time of year is the plants are going dormant so they don't need to be watered after the initial installation. Just water them in when planting and leave them alone! You and your plants will be a step ahead next spring!

It's time to say goodnight to your gardens. If you haven't cut back all your perennials yet, now is the time. All perennials including perennial grasses should be cut back close to the ground. Some people like to leave their ornamental grasses tall, but if you cut them back it reduces the risk of rot and keeps your grasses healthy. If you have Rose bushes or other ornamentals that are prone to winter kill, it helps to put a fresh layer of mulch or straw around the base of the plant to help insulate them. If you are in a high wind area, you might want to wrap evergreens like Arborvitae or Cypress with burlap to keep them from drying out over the winter. Broadleaf evergreens like Rhododendron, Andromeda, and Mountain Laurel can be sprayed with Wilt Proof or moisture guard. This will lock the moisture in the leaves to help prevent winter damage. If you have trouble with your hydrangeas getting big beautiful leaves but no flowers, cover them or wrap them for the winter to protect the canes from freezing in the early spring. Another great thing to do right now is preventative winter pruning. Cutting back sagging branches or overgrown Hydrangea trees is a good way to prevent ice damage.

Horizontal branches hold ice build-up easier than vertical branches so pay close attention when pruning and shaping plants in the fall.

Fall decorating is a great way to add curb appeal. A couple corn stalks, a few hay bales and some mums are a great way to enhance the end of your driveway. Make sure when you decorate, you don't block your house number. This will make it easier for emergency services and delivery drivers to find your house. Your mailbox is the first place people look to find your house number and as the sun sets earlier, it gets harder and harder to find addresses.

Landscape lighting is always busier in the fall. If you are leaving your house before the sun comes up or get home after it sets, landscape lighting is a nice thing to have. Landscape lighting does add curb appeal and makes your landscape look great after dark, but there are other benefits as well. Landscape lighting was originally used for safety and security. If you have steps leading to your front door you should light them up so no one trips or falls because they can't see the steps. If you have shadows under big plants, you can install landscape lighting to prevent places for potential criminals to hide. It's nice to be able to look out into your yard at night and see everything if you hear a weird noise or if you are expecting company. Finally, landscape lighting is a great way to add curb appeal. If you are trying to sell your house in the fall, it makes your house visible during the drive by hours and could increase showings.

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#### Tax Talks

On the heels of yet another riveting tax article I wanted to stay with the retirement topic but dive into the vast world of self-directed IRAs, also known as SDIRAs. I will use the example of IRA,

but this can extend to 401k's, HSAs, Roth IRAs and others. A while back I stumbled upon a podcast about a woman's retirement accounts owning spaceships and I cannot stop thinking about it. Since then, I continue to ask myself, "What else can my retirement accounts do for me? And how can I have more fun?" Before going into this month's article, as always, you should consult with a tax professional, attorney and/or financial professional to help with your estate planning and to navigate the rules for self-directed IRAs. Knowledge is power, so consult, consult, consult and vet out anyone you choose to work with.

Back to the fun stuff. You may be like many of my clients who want to own a rental property but don't want to sink all of your cash or maybe don't have the cash on hand. Maybe it is cryptocurrency, rentals, cows, maybe NFTs like a spaceship in the metaverse. My personal HSA is about to own NFTs in the metaverse, and I cannot be more excited. Self-directed IRAs are unique because they offer the freedom and flexibility to invest in a wider range of assets beyond traditional investment options like stocks, bonds and mutual funds. They can be used as an untapped source of capital to improve not only your life but your beneficiaries, your community or your retirement.

Yes, there are always risks, which is why my opinion is to stick to what you know and love when investing. But what if you love something like real estate, but you may not be an expert? Why not partner? Your IRA can be just one partner in a partnership, which can take all sorts of forms. You can always have a combination of partners; an individual, a Roth IRA, an IRA, and HSA, another LLC. The combinations are endless, and the potential is truly incredible.



I have to focus in on just one of many tax benefits; imagine your Roth IRA owning a rental growing your assets and account balances tax advantaged. "What is your child doing now to build character and values, learn citizenship and leadership while having fun?" asks Mark Barbernitz, Scout Executive and CEO of the Heart of New England Council, Scouting America. "We have only a short period of time. Perhaps nine or ten years, to work with our kids to develop leadership and character traits, and scouting is a terrific way of instilling those traits and offer our children opportunities to have fun while they learn!"

The Heart of New England Council is comprised of Scouts and Scout Leaders from most of Central Massachusetts. Barbernitz and a small staff provide leadership training, encouragement, and supplies to troops throughout the region.

The official date when Boy Scouts of America will transition to a

new name: Scouting America, is February 8, 2025,the anniversary of BSA's founding. However, many scout leaders are already identifying themselves as Scouting America to reflect the inclusion of girls in their programs. In fact, according to Barbernitz, girls have been participating in troops for at least a decade. The name change will reinforce that girls and boys are equally welcome.

"The Scout Oath and Scout Law reinforce family values." Barbernitz says. "These values stay with scouts throughout their lives, giving scouts guidance for how to live and make decisions."

Scouts may participate in a wide range of activities. "Camping is a big part of scouting, but if you are not interested in camping, there is still a lot to do, a lot to choose from, and a lot of things

you can learn!" Barbernitz explains. "Scouting is a lot more than tying knots!"

Merit Badges are earned through participating and learning about a subject or topic. Scouts can determine which of 135 badges to earn, and the list of merit badge topics offers something for everyone! A few of the topics include: crafts, trades, sports, business, chemistry, cooking, camping, graphic art, programming, swimming, photography, chess, First Aid, and kayaking. So no matter what your child's interests may be, there are activities and learning opportunities, to say nothing of opportunities to make friends and have fun!

"Everything has a purpose." Barbernitz continues. For instance, participating in the Pinewood Derby is an opportunity to spend time with family members and build a car together." "Scouting is about learning while having fun and making friends, and in the process learning how to be leaders." He states. "What participating in Scouts did for me, beginning when I first became a scout at 8 years old, I want to share with others."

According to Barbernitz, it costs about \$160.00 to become a scout, including some of the basic uniform. The costs can be offset through the popcorn fundraising sales, and financial assistance is available as well. "Costs should never be a factor for anyone interested in joining!" Barbernitz emphasizes.

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We all hope to enjoy long, healthy lives, physician declares in writing that the retaining the ability to think clearly and make our own decisions. But life doesn't always work out that way - which is why you need to prepare for a potential incapacity that could affect your independence and possibly create financial

problems for your family.

So, in thinking about incapacity planning, you may want to consider the following arrangements:

• Health care power of attorney – When you establish a health care power of attorney, you name someone, such as a spouse or adult child, to make medical decisions on your behalf, should you become incapable of making them on your own due to disability or illness. These decisions include choosing doctors, treatments and care facilities.

• Financial power of attorney - With a financial power of attorney, you designate someone to assume a variety of duties for you in case you become incapacitated. These tasks include investing, selling property, paying bills and debts, collecting Social Security benefits and adding or changing insurance

When establishing a health care or financial power of attorney, you may need to decide whether it's "durable" or "springing." A durable power of attorney typically takes effect immediately after you sign it, have it notarized and witnessed. So, the person you've chosen to have power of attorney — sometimes called an "agent" — can act on your behalf whenever you choose. On the other hand, you could select a power of attorney that "springs" into effect only when you become incapacitated — hence, the "springing" designation.

One issue affecting a springing power of attorney involves the speed with which it can be enacted. Generally, it won't go into effect until a licensed person granting the power of attorney is indeed incapacitated. This could cause a problem if your chosen agent needs to act quickly on your behalf. It's because of this potential delay that a durable power of attorney is often favored over a springing power of attorney. However, everyone's cir-



cumstances are different, so if you have a choice between a durable or springing power of attorney, you may want to consult with an estate-planning professional for guidance.

Apart from the health care and financial powers of attorney, you may also want to consider one other incapacity-related legal document — a living will. When you establish a living will, you describe the steps you would or wouldn't want taken to keep you alive, along with other medical decisions, including pain management and organ donation. Obviously, the decision to create a living will is highly personal, involving your feelings about self-sufficiency and the circumstances that define the quality of life you wish to have. But the mere fact of having a living will can relieve your loved ones of having to make potentially agonizing decisions.

Planning for an incapacity may not be the most pleasant task — but it's an important one. Of course, you may never become incapacitated at all, but by making the proper arrangements, you can make things easier for yourself and your family - just in case.

gym, and an indoor pool, and Seven Saws operates what the Soccer Asylum calls the "bar and lounge," section of their facility. Although the Paxton and Holden locations differ in their facility "layouts," they both emulate the company's mission statement "Drink Well. Do Good.", as the locations encourage an enjoyable experience with the pairing of fresh, local beer, good company, and a focus on giving back to the community!

As the Seven Saws Brewery's name suggests, the company specializes in crafting its rotating beer options. The brewery offers wine from a local winery, seltzers, hard ciders, and non-alcoholic beverages, allowing for a beverage that serves everyone's needs. The company is notorious for its widespread selection of beer, and as Troy stated, even those who do not particularly enjoy beer have a chance at finding a drink they are fond of. For instance, the brewery offers a "fullspectrum" of beers from light loggers, to "citrusy" German-style wheat beers, to heavy IPA beers, all the way to seasonal flavors such as their smoked maple porter. In conjunction with the expansive drink menu, the Industrial Drive location offers food truck options if you are feeling a bit peckish! It is essential to note that Seven Saws is

From every detail down to the company name, Seven Saws, which is a historical reference to the mills in Holden, the partners are devoted to giving homage to the community. Furthermore, Troy explained that "Our expansion and our goal to grow is not necessarily bigger is better. We like the approach that we are taking which is let's find an area that could use a community gathering hole and would embrace their local brewery. As Troy emphasizes, Seven Saws is dedicated to brewing an environment that provides joy to all.

So, what does community mean for the brewery? Well, as Troy emphasizes, the brewery is not only family-friendly but pet-friendly too! Seven Saws has also been "home" to a variety of events from baby showers to weddings, the options for events are expansive with the company. Furthermore, unlike typical bars/breweries, the company takes an "anti-bar," approach where even seating arrangements are organized to curate conversation (or as Troy exclaims, whatever experience you want to make of it during your time at the brewery!).
